
Now that residential students have settled into a routine, activities, recreation (mostly basket-ball), and various organizations are moving into operation.



## **Dorm News**

Since I was a presenter at the WVSD&B Fall Conference, I would like to share a topic:

Special Students - more impor-

tantly, the nature and needs of today's student learners are radically different from those in the past. The students may not be making the rules, but emerging student values, needs, and expectations are driving all residential schools for the deaf in new directions. Where reformers have failed in efforts to reshape special education, the learners themselves have and are changing residential schools and residential school leadership.

Also, there is a reason for residential schools fo the deaf. It's called special students. Everything the staff and the administators do should somehow be connected with making things better for special students and helping them become what they need to be and even more. Just as successful businesses are increasingly consumer conscious and service-oriented, the best residential schools understand that they must be student centered.

Effective residential schools listen well, involve people in meaningful ways, care about learners as individuals and as a total community, and respond quickly and constructively when problems arise.

Managing the student body of a modern secondary deaf school is different and difficult. Today's students are more assertive, more worldly, more questioning, and more at risk than previous generations of learners. They are also more vulnerable and more in need of coping and problem solving skills than ever before. Building a residential school that meets the needs of today's diverse student body is changing - but it is also manageable, rewarding, and what the residential school is supposed to be all about.

This report shows how we can manage today's students in ways that:

- impose order and organization on the chaos of adolescence
- · remove barriers to learner growth

- establish a safe, sane, and healthy environment for students to learn what they need to know
- maximize opportunities for students to be the best they can be (to release the hidden hero in every adolescent learner)

## Based on a growing body of research, this belief is expressed in variety of ways:

- All special students can learn and learning skills should be lifelong.
- The residential school expects all students to learn.
- Every learner can be successful the only variable is time.
- The residential school has an obligation to teach every learner.

The first step in managing today's adolescent learners is the staff and the administrators to champion the cause that every learner's success is the central focus of the residential school and its rescources. If we all believe that all students can learn and the staff believes it, and the special students believe it, managing fifty, one hundred or two hundred students becomes a whole lot easier.

Believing that all students can learn implies a willingness to take on all comers - to accept and accommodate whatever mixes of ethnic, economic, and cultural diversity the student population presents.

## Here are the following things we are trying to do:

• We are in a process of developing a "Peer Helpers" program at this time.

- We are trying to establish e-mail activity in the evenings.
- We are trying to set up a Tutorial Program for those students having difficulty in certain areas.
- We are having a lot of Residence Education Assemblies lately such as respect for oneself and others as well; help each other with our understanding; love and long term patience; sexual harassment; reviewing all policies and procedures to assure fairness; be sensitive to others who are different from our students (transfer from other schools to WVSD&B) from other cultures (loss, identity crises, etc).

We are still working on all of these things, but with your support, we can create a positive environment.

## WVSD&B Career Classes Visit Area Businesses

The Career Majors Classes, the Intro to Careers Class and Mr. Chilcoat, Mr. Sevigny, Mrs. Teter, and Mrs. Brown went to Moorefield, WV on October 8th for a field trip of three area businesses. The first stop was Pilgrim's Pride, a chicken processing plant. The students and teachers were shown a video presentation followed by an excellent tour of their facility. Twenty-two hundred people are employed at their plant. Many job opportunities are available at Pilgrim's Pride.

The group's next tour was of American Woodmark. They have several other locations throughout the United States, with this being the largest. The biggest customers for American Woodmark are Lowe's and Home Depot. Approximately 80 people are employed in Moorefield. The tour included how the bare wood is processed, cut, glued and stained to produce the cabinets. The skills for the workers are varied, but they do offer on-the-job training for prospective employees.

The last stop was the South Branch Cinema 6 movie theater. Ms. Kelly Williams explained how the film is shipped in different reels and how it is spliced together. She showed the students the projection room and explained why the room is temperature controlled.

All of these tours were educational and very enjoyable. They exposed our students to many employment options.

We had a lot of fun at the Halloween party. We want to thank Mr. Barry Nealis and Mrs. Beth Surber for their support.



## FBLA Installs Officers




## **Seniors Take ACT Test**







# **Gallaudet Diagnostic Test**

The Gallaudet Diagnostic Test (GDT) was administered to freshmen, sophomores, and juniors on Tuesday, February 26. Seventeen students participated in this year's exam.

The GDT, given annually, is designed to measure grade ranges rather than specific grade levels and to help identify strengths and weaknesses of each student while in high school. This test does not qualify as an admissions test for students desiring acceptance to Gallaudet University.

This test, also know as the Stanford Diagnostic Test, is divided into five subtests:

# Reading Comprehension Reading Vocabulary Mathematics: Concepts and Application Mathematics: Computation Writing

Gallaudet provides a valuable service by processing the answer sheets and sending two copies of the analysis to our school. One is sent to parents and the second is kept in our language profiles.


We recently received word that eighth grader Jessica Morrison is this year's winner of the West Virginia Golden Horseshoe Test.

We appreciate the work experience opportunities each of these students gets at HCSSW.








# CEDAR LAKES




