Justin Is Back!


Justin Gregory, Class of '08, has returned WVSD to after attending public school last vear.







Football is a rough and fierce sport and the atmosphere it is played in is intense.

Coaches are yelling from the sidelines, fans are thundering in the stands, bands are blaring and teammates are calling out the play and taunting their opponents.


Imagine all of this cacophony disappearing and playing the game hearing impaired.

That's what playing football is like for the six students at the West Virginia School for the Deaf (WVSD) who are playing at various levels in the Hampshire County School system.


They are also making history as the most students from the school to ever play football in the public school system — a feat they take seriously.

Terry Withrow, 17, will go down in the annals at WVSD. Next year, he will be the first student from WVSD to play football for four years straight.

A member of the Hampshire High School Trojans varsity team, Withrow hails from Poca, W.Va, and serves as a defensive tackle,

which fits his brawny frame.

Also on the varsity team for the Hampshire Trojans is Justin Rhodes, 17, of Alum Creek, W.Va

The young man serves as a halfback and defensive linebacker for the Trojans as #31.

This is the second year Rhodes, a state qualifier in track, will be going up against his football foes.

"I really enjoy playing football. The best part is running the ball and tackling," the North Carolina Panther fan said.

Both young men practice daily, except for games days, and lift weights to keep fit for the game.

They even arrived at WVSD dorm weeks before the school year began to make sure they attended practice.

Thirteen-year-old Roddy Stickley from High View plays full-back and defensive end for Romney Middle School.

Stickley, #42, said he decided to play football because he thought it "would be fun"- an idea that has become a reality for him.

"I have also learned to be tough, to be part of a team and to have patience. I get nervous every once in a while, but I really like playing," he commented.

Along with practicing with the team, the bright, smiling, young man said he likes to play basketball, lift weights and exercise to keep in tip-top shape.

Three 15-year-olds from WVSD are on the roster for the Hamp-shire Trojans freshman team.

Michael Jarvis of Chloe serves as a halfback and on special teams.

His father Jeff attended WVSD and graduated in 1988 but didn't play football at that time.

"My dad seemed scared about me playing, but my mom was all for it. But, now he is OK with me playing," Jarvis noted.

Jarvis said he grew up watching football on TV and decided to play.

"I really have a lot of fun," he added.

Josh Duff, #25, of Smithfield said he decided to play the sport because he likes the running and hitting aspect of football.

"It doesn't bother me when I get hit. I feel fine with it," he remarked

Serving as fullback and linebacker, Duff, who dons a serious, tough football look, said he plans on playing next year also.

Page Miller, whose hometown is Martinsburg, was declared the "top runner" at Romney Middle School last year.

Curiosity made this happy young man decide to play football.

"A lot of my friends wanted me to play, so I decided to see what it would be like. I'm glad I did because I really like it," he reflected.

Miller serves as a split end and on special teams and he loves to


All plan to continue playing football next year at Hampshire High School.

Bob Haines, athletic director WVSD, said he is extremely proud of all the boys and so is the school.

"These boys all have good attitudes and are good kids. They are school leaders. They help younger kids who are younger be more mature, they help those with behavior problems, and they challenge the other students to excel," he said.

Since football is not offered at WVSD, Haines felt Hampshire County School administration and coaching staff should be commended for allowing the boys to play.

"It is just such a wonderful experience for them. They have been accepted by the players and everyone else involved. They have been treated tremendously well in Hampshire County," he said.

WVSD Makes History Again!

This year WVSD became the first deaf school in the United States to be selected to participate in the National Archery in Schools program. Scott Warner, West Virginia Department of Natural Resources (WVDNR), came here Wednesday and Thursday, Sept. 7 and 8 to help kick off the program. "We came up here and had the opportunity to meet with the faculty and the students. We have been around the state, and I have not dealt with a better group of students anywhere. This is a heck of a good program, and this school should be very proud," Warner said.

Mr. Warner and co-instructor Dave McClung taught safety and the basics to ten students Wednesday. By the end of the session several of the students were sinking five out of five arrows in the bull's-eye! Warner said, "I think we'll see some of these kids in tournament action someday... They picked it up quick. These kids are good.

There's no difference between them and the students at any other school."

The program will be taught by Mr. Bob Haines, WVSDB Athletic Director and PE instructor. In August, Mr. Haines underwent the required National Archery Association training to become a Level I instructor.


WVDNR Director Frank Jezioro was here Thursday for a special ceremony, during which 9th and 10th grade students from WVSD demonstrated what they'd already learned. Jezioro said, "The thing I like most about this program is that so many kids can participate. There are kids across the country that may not be big enough to play football, basketball or be on the wrestling team, but every child can be an archer."

This project was funded jointly by WVDNR and the National Wild Turkey Federation, who also sent officials to WVSD for the Thursday's ceremony.


















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
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












Five To Compete in Academic Bowl



Students Modify Poem To Reflect Their World

The language of poetry, often shared through the "senses," evokes imagery for the reader based on his/her personal background and experiences. In the silent world of the deaf, that which cannot be heard must somehow be explained through other ways. 
















Principal's Post

The weather has given us a glimmer of spring the past few days -- beautiful sunshine and


warmth. I have not seen any crocus yet, but I am sure the spring flowers will be poking through the ground soon.

Students of the Month for December were Jason Holliday and Brittany Austin. Thanks for being caring and cooperative toward students and staff. Keep up the good work!






Career Majors Travel to Veterans Administration Medical Center

from the ESDAA Tournament with the Sportsmanship Award. The boys' basketball team came in third place in the ESDAA Tournament in snowy Rome, New York.





and duplicate layers. Mrs. Dodgins' third period class laminated the cards.



We go there as the defending champions! It is not only the ESDAA championship we are defending but also the "21" shooting contest and foul shooting championships! We have won the "21" shooting championship for the past 3 years. The tournament takes place from February 22nd - 25th in Rome, New York. The advantage of playing the ESDAA tournament in late February is that it helps my team to stay motivated as the end of the season gets closer. I know that my team is totally ready to go! We are going to compete for 9th and 10th place in the Potomac Valley Conference on February 18th against Harman at Petersburg High School. Justin Rhodes will be the shooter in the 3-point shooting contest in the same event. Justin Rhodes and Page Miller will be the shooters for the 3point shooting contest in the ESDAA tournament. Best of luck to these shooters! Below is a recap of each game since the 8th game of the season.

#8 Paw Paw 80, WVSD 44

We traveled to Paw Paw Jan. 20 to play a tough conference opponent. We did everything to slow their two players who scored 25 points each, but unfortunately these two players were on fire. My boys did their best in defense, but we committed too many turnovers in offense. We managed to pour in 44 points to the final score. I was very proud of my boys for putting all of their hearts into this game. Unfortunately, things didn't go our way in 4th quarter. 
#16 WVSD 69, New Hope Christian 54

most famous clan war was between
the Hatfields of West Virginia and the

part of our national folklore, the
cause of the feud is debatable. It may
have begun with a dispute over the
ownership of a hog or by the ill-fated
love of Roseanne McCoy and
Johnse Hatfield, but the feud came
to an end on Feb. 18, 1890 when
Ellison "Cotton Top" Mounts, a man
of limited mental capacity, was publicly executed for the murder of Alifair
McCoy.

Through an innovative partnership between staff at the School for the Deaf and the acting company, the performance was shadow interpreted by Mr. Adrian, Mr. Coleman, Mrs. Dodgins, Mrs. Heare, Mrs. Loar, Mrs. Page, and Mrs. Staley, giving full accessibility to our students.

Prior to the evening performance, the acting troupe provided afternoon drama workshops for our student body.

"My favorite part of this story is at the end, when Roseanne died and left a locket with Aunt Jenny to give to Johnse. It had her baby's hair, Roseanna's hair, and Cotton Top's hair in that locket which will help Johnse to remember them," said Justin Gregory.

Pam Thompson added, "I really enjoyed watching the play. It was interesting and good. I hope Theatre WV will have another, but different play next year, so we can watch it. I also enjoyed the workshop -- it was fun!"

Page Miller said, "The shadow interpreters made it easier to follow the play. I could see what they were saying and watch their actions at the same time.






Third game: WVSD 72, ASD 63



As Communication Center Coordinator, I was so proud to coordinate "History Through Deaf Eyes." Developed by Gallaudet University, "History Through Deaf Eyes" is a traveling social history exhibition aligning nearly 200 years of the United States history with the experiences of people who are deaf. Using posters on the walls, Power Point presentations, and historical books and pictures about WVSD, this exhibition illustrated the shared experiences of deaf students, education, and work, as well as the divergent ways deaf people see themselves, communicate, employ and adapt technology, and determine their own futures. On Parents' Day, April 14, we also performed "Song out of Silence," a play by Bernard Reines honoring the first three pioneers in deaf education: Dr. Mason Cogswell, Rev. Thomas Gallaudet, and Professor Laurent Clerc.

At WVSD, we are committed to helping our deaf and hard of hearing students flourish in their emotional, so-

cial, and academic lives. One goal of this activity was to present them with an understanding of how they fit into the world. Hopefully, our students have a better understanding of themselves and their history.

Although the State Legislature is credited with the founding of WVSDB, these schools owe their existence to the efforts of Mr. Howard H. Johnson, a blind man. Prior to June 20, 1863 when West Virginia was still a part of Virginia, the deaf and the blind children were educated at the Virginia School in Staunton. Our school opened in Romney in 1870. There were twenty-five deaf and five blind students to enroll at that time.

A: "Yes."


Q: "Can you draw animals?"

Julie Howell, case manager, asked for a Sign Language class, so WVSD staff members go there to teach American Sign Language (ASL).



There was much to be learned about "Old School" that I had not realized until experiencing it firsthand.







The shooters took "center stage" at 3 p.m., and after launching 30 arrows apiece, the judges scored and tallied the 300 participants.


WOW! Results show WVSD had 6 of their 13 archers scoring 200 or higher! Terry Withrow led with 241 points and took 5th place overall.



Director of Student Living



We wish Mrs. Wysopal a long and happy retirement.


