

Jack W. Brady, Superintendent, Kentucky School for the Deaf, Danville, Kentucky, was born at Waycross, Georgia, March 2, 1927.

Mr. Brady graduated from Waycross Senior High School in June 1944, and received a B.S. degree in education in June, 1950, from the Georgia Teachers College. He had special training to teach the deaf at Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf and the University of Pittsburgh in 1952-53. Mr. Brady received his Master's degree in education with a major in administration from the University of Pittsburgh in August 1959.

From 1944 until 1946, Mr. Brady was in the United States Navy.

He was a teacher and coach of football, basketball, and track at the Georgia School for the Deaf, Cave Spring, Georgia 1950-52, 1953-54 teacher and boy's supervisor at Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf, 1954-57 Field Representative and Counselor at the Georgia School for the Deaf, and returned to the Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf as a teacher from 1957 until 1959.

Mr. Brady was employed as Principal of the American School for the Deaf, West Hartford, Connecticut, for the 1959-60 school year and came to the West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and the Blind in 1960, where he served as Superintendent until 1966, when he moved to the Kentucky School for the Deaf as Superintendent.

Mr. Brady is a member of the Danville Rotary Club, Conference of Executives, American Association of the Deaf, Alexander Graham Bell Association of the Deaf, and the Kentucky Association of School Administrators.

Mr. Brady and his wife, Dorothy, have two daughters, Beth Ann and Ruth. The Bradys are members of the Methodist Church. He is resident at Savannah, Georgia.

He passed away October 16, 2018 at his home under the care of Hospice Savannah. He was 91 years old.
