## Improvement Council Update

As part of the North Central Association accreditation process, during the 1992-'93 school year, the faculty and staff of the Junior-Senior High School for the Deaf participated in a self-study of the school's curriculum, the school activities and dormitory activities, and the residential living program and addressed both strengths and weaknesses of the total school program.

In January, 1994, educators from other schools visited the school to interview staff and students and to observe in both the school and the dorm.

From the information obtained, the visiting team wrote a report concerning the school's total strengths and weaknesses and recommendations to improve the deficits. After reviewing the report, the school's Faculty Senate and School Improvement Council must establish a means to implement the team's recommendations.

At the last meeting, the School Improvement Council decided to focus on the following action to improve deficits in the school's program.

[1] revise the curriculum, which would include the development of an alternative educational program for students who are not college-bound

[2] expand work experience opportunities for students

[3] develop an independent living skills program for all students

[4] more recreational activities in the dorm.




## Girls' Basketball






Moving up from Junior Varsity is Stephen Daniels, a star guard, who averaged 21.9 points a game last season.










## Clark Gets Job At McDonald's



On Monday, January 9, science and vocational agriculture students traveled to Cumberland, Maryland to visit pet stores. This field trip was planned as a career exploration opportunity.




"Splinter," the white rat, recently became a mother!

The first store, Scales-N-Tails, had a large number of freshwater and salt water aquariums. We saw ghost shrimp, salt water crabs, large catfish, and one exotic fish that cost more than five hundred dollars. We also saw various lizards and frogs. The shop owner had his own personal pet lizard, an iguana, that had free run of the front counter of the shop.

While at the shop, we asked the employees about their responsibilities and duties. We asked about their pay. We asked about their working hours. We learned that the animals require tending everyday, so the store has to be opened 365 days a year.

We learned that operating a pet store is very labor intensive. Animals must be fed and watered, and their cages or aquariums tended to everyday, sometimes more than once a day. The store owner told us that the store has been open for less than a year and that they have experienced a few disasters. They have learned a lot and feel confident that the worst of the learning experiences are behind them.

One of the store employees, Garrett

Rice, a Frostburg State University student, is a budding reptile expert. Garrett told us that he became interested in reptiles as a young person in order to overcome his fear of snakes. Garrett told us that his fear has become curiosity and respect. Garrett has his own reptile zoo at his home. We hope that in the spring, Garrett will visit WVSD and share his knowledge and his reptiles with us.

We next visited Petland which is located in the Cumberland Mall. Petland has a variety of rodents available for sale including white laboratory rats, mice, hamsters, gerbils, rabbits, and guinea pigs. Petland also sells ferrets, fish, birds, tarantulas, lizards, puppies, and kittens. Because the employees were so busy while we were at the store, we did not get

much of an opportunity to talk with them about their work.


For several years, science classes have kept living animals in the classroom. We have an iguana, a tarantula, and two hamsters. While at Petland, we used FFA funds to increase the size of our zoo. We bought a rabbit, two finches, a white laboratory rat, and a guinea pig. All the critters are kept in the agriculture/science classroom and work area located in the old printing shop in the basement. These animals give the students the opportunity to learn how to care for pets. The animals also give students the pleasure of holding and "loving up" cuddly critters. We have seen some very warm feelings emerge in

### **WVSD Celebrates Deaf Awareness Days**





Dr. Patsy K. Shank of the West Virginia School for the Deaf, Romney, WV, has been named one of 35 state educators to serve as a cadre member for Project CATS: Coordinated and Thematic Science, announced state Superintendent Dr. Henry Marockie.

Project CATS is a five-year, \$4.1 million teacher enhancement grant funded by the National Science Foundation (NSF) for West Virginia science teachers in grades 7-10. 
