We always welcome parents of birthday students.

















Middle School Volleyball News



The fourth sophomore, Matthew Hart, is joining the team for the first time.



Seven members of the West Virginia School for the Deaf FFA participated in the West Virginia FFA Career Development Events at West Virginia University in Morgantown on Sept. 29. Specific events included forestry and seventh-eighth grade agriscience knowledge.

The forestry event consisted of a general knowledge/management test, tree identification test, compass and pacing, forestry equipment identification, and timber cruising. Four members from each school were allowed to participate in these forestry events. The School for the Deaf came in 19th out of 22 schools with only three members competing in these events. Michael Jarvis placed 58th and had 180 points; Jason Holliday placed 64th and had 160 points; and Page Miller placed 79th and had 97 points. They studied under Mr. Leatherman, our agriculture teacher and FFA advisor.

Our seventh and eighth grade agriscience team placed 6th out of 7 schools. Members of the seventh and eighth grade team participated

in events consisting of plants, animals, agricultural mechanics, tools identification, and FFA history. Shawna Weatherholt scored 53 points, Holly Ramos had 40 points, Chelsea Hill obtained 35 points and Amber Williams earned 10 points.

During our time at WVU, we split into groups and explored the campus. Some went to the Mountain Lair to eat and to ride the PRT (personal rapid transportation). Some of the members went to the WVU basketball arena and the visitors' center.

Mr. Engelman's Lizard (Artie) Dies





Eighth grader Ethan Bolyard won first place in the bubble gum sculpting competition, and freshman Polly Hodge took second place.








Tech Ed Students Design Popcorn Boxes as Class Project

Each year, groups of seventh and eighth graders rotate through four of WVSD's Technical Education (Tech Ed) areas, so they can get an idea of what each area is about. This helps students find a Tech Ed area in which they are interested and gives them the opportunity to acquire some skills in each area. At the end of ninth grade, all students pick one of the Tech Ed areas in which they want to major. Exposure to Tech Ed in 7th and 8th grades helps them decide which area is compatible with their interests and skills.

During the second nine weeks, Mrs. Dodgins' eighth grade students used the programs Photoshop and Print Shop to design popcorn boxes. During this activity, they learned about marketing and about "target audience." Since their target audience was young children, they used bright colors and big fonts.



In three consecutive days, WVSD defeated The Learning Center in an exhibition game (76-49), Mill Neck (49-15), and then Austine (71-33) in the championship game before a joyous home crowd waving and clapping their hands along with the beat of a big bass drum.

Roddy Stickley scored a game-high 19 points, while Page Miller added 16, Justin Rhodes 14, and Josh Duff 10 in the final game.

Rhodes, who recently surpassed 1,000 career points, was named to the Division III First Team, while Miller and Stickley were named to the tournament's Second Team.

"This tournament is the main thing for all of us," Rhodes said. "It's really exciting with all of our fans here."

Rhodes and Terry Withrow, co-captains of the team. have taken on more of a leadership role during their senior season. The two have seen the squad steadily improve over the course of the season, giving them reason to feel confident about the tournament.


See is now in his seventh year at WVSD and has led the Lions to three ESDAA tournament championships in four years.



The West Virginia State Board of Education developed Policy 4373, Student Code of Conduct, to establish a high standard for all students in West Virginia. It is reprinted here for all of us to review and to remind us of the high expectations that will guide student behav-

- 3.1 All students enrolled in West Virginia public schools shall behave in a manner that promotes a school environment that is nurturing, orderly, safe and conducive to learning and personal-social development.
- 3.1.1 Students will help create an atmosphere free from bullying, intimidation and harassment.
- 3.1.2 Students will demonstrate honesty and trustworthiness.
- 3.1.3 Students will treat others with respect, deal peacefully with anger, use good manners and be considerate of the feelings of others.

- 3.1.4 Students will demonstrate responsibility, use self-control and be self-disciplined.
- 3.1.5 Students will demonstrate fairness, play by the rules, and will not take advantage of others.
- 3.1.6 Students will demonstrate compassion and caring.
- 3.1.7 Students will demonstrate good citizenship by obeying laws and rules, respecting authority, and by cooperating with others.
- 4.1 These regulations apply to all students attending public schools in West Virginia during any education-sponsored event, whether in a classroom, elsewhere on school premises, on a school bus or other vehicle used for a school related event, or at a schoolsponsored activity or event, whether or not it is held on school premises, in a building or other property used or operated by a county board of education, Regional Education Service Agency (RESA) or West Virginia Department of Education, or in another facility being used by any of those agencies.

Good ideas are always worth revisiting. Taking a look at the code of conduct and seeing how well our students live up to that code is truly a joy. At Seaton Hall we have the best of the best in our students and child care workers.

WVSD 54 Delaware SD 29



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

as he came up with 5 points and Josh Duff also scored 5 points. Jason Holliday added 1 point to the final score.


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
WVSD 59 Union 50





This year the Mid-Atlantic Regional Academic Bowl (AB) competition was held at Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf (WPSD) in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, March 8-11. The AB is sponsored by Gallaudet University. A total of 16 schools (11 teams from our region and five from "At-Large") competed by answering a wide variety of questions related to math, current events, grammar structure. Deaf studies, sports, geography, and history.

Academic Bowl has basic rules. There are three rounds. During the first and second rounds, each player is given 20 seconds to answer a question, with the exception of math questions, which are allowed 30 seconds. In the third round, there are only two

minutes for both teams. All four players must participate and answer questions. Only four members of each team are permitted to participate, but the alternate (sub) must play at least once.



This method made it hard for deaf people to follow the action of the play. Using shadow interpreters, each actor has his own interpreter, who follows him around on stage (like a "shadow"), interpreting what he says.

who wants to become a movie star.
One night she is magically transformed into a glamourous star — but
only between the hours of midnight
to 4 a.m. Then she goes back to plain
old Ella. Passionella falls in love with



TEAM WORK... That's the best phrase to explain it. Recently two local FFA Chapters, Hampshire County and the School for the Deaf, traveled to Charleston, WV. They had two missions to complete: first, to lobby for animal science education and for an animal science educational facility at Hampshire High School; and second, to sell one ham and one bacon for the School for the Deaf Chapter at the state

FFA Ham, Bacon and Egg Auction. On the morning of March 12, Mr. Isaac Lewis, advisor, and four members of the Hampshire County Chapter (Ashley Bohrer, Rebecca Whitacre, Brittany Hott, and Elizabeth McKenzie) had the mission to promote animal science education and the benefits of a specialized animal science training facility at Hampshire High School (HHS). To do this, they had two angora rabbits which they used to demonstrate one of the benefits of animal science education. Three members of WVSD (Justin Gregory, Page Miller, and Roderick Stickley) assisted in moving the rabbits. They first met with Delegate Rowan, who took them on a tour of the Capitol and introduced them to other mem-

bers of the legislature. In the afternoon, the Hampshire County members met with the Governor's wife and presented her with an angora scarf that they had made from the fleece of one of the rabbits. WVSD members, assisted by their advisor, Mr. E. A. Leatherman, entered one ham and one bacon in the Sate FFA Ham, Bacon, and Egg Auction.

The pig that provided the ham and bacon was raised by WVSD FFA members at the HHS Agricultural Education complex. The members participated in football and cross country at HHS, then maintained the pig after practice. Mr. Lewis worked closely with WVSD FFA members and their advisor in obtain-

ing and raising the pig. WVSD FFA members and members of HHS FFA participated in the slaughter of FFA pigs at Eddy's Farm & Slaughter. Mr. William Roomsburg, former agriculture educator, Mr. Lewis, and members of the HHS FFA assisted WVSD members in cutting the pig carcass into the retail cuts and preparing for cure at the HHS ag ed meats facility. When curing was finished, Mr. William Chaney and members of the HHS FFA assisted WVSD FFA members in removing the hams and bacons from cure. Next, Mr. William Roomsburg and Mr. Lewis assisted



WVSD FFA members in trimming the hams and bacons and preparing them for smoking. The meat was smoked in the smoker at the HHS ag ed facility.

On the afternoon of March 12, Roderick Stickley, WVSD FFA Chapter President; Justin Gregory, Sentinel; and Page Miller entered one ham and one bacon in the State FFA Ham, Bacon & Egg Auction. The auction was held at Building 7, Capitol Complex, at 7:00 p.m. The advisors and their members met Superintendent McBride and Mr. Bill Raney, West Virginia Coal Association representative, at the auction. The Grand Champion Ham went for

\$2,300; the Grand Champion Bacon went for \$6,400; and the Grand Champion Eggs sold for \$10,000. The last two pieces of meat sold at the auction were the ham and bacon from WVSD FFA. The first sold was the bacon, shown by Page Miller, who is from Martinsburg. The auction was hot: people were cheering and Page's head kept reaching for the sky! The bacon, which sold for \$1,500 was bought by Mr. Bill Raney, West Virginia Coal Association representative. Next, Roderick Stickley, from High View, presented the ham for auction. Again, the bidding

was hot. He had a special cheering section: Ashley, Rachel, Brittany, and Elizabeth, the HHS girls, egging on the crowd. The ham sold to Doug Houser and Shannon Toth, representatives from Kroger, for \$2,700. It was donated back for auction, where Mr. Bill Raney bought the ham for \$1,000. 
ESDAA Girls' Basketball Division II at Rochester, NY







vision. The system has had continuous reviews since the 1980's by counselors, administrators, parents, teachers, child care workers, and, most importantly, the students themselves. We are in agreement that as a community, we value the guidelines that give us freedom to enjoy our community safely together.

Some activities in our community are new and some are old. BINGO night on April 1 was a first this year. The annual egg hunt on April 5 (with money hidden in some of the plastic eggs) was a continuation of an old activity, enjoyed year to year. National Youth Art Month Exhibit 2007




On the beautiful spring day of May 9, WVSD Secondary sent six athletes and five adults to the annual Spring Special Olympics at Hampshire High School.



We appreciate everyone who worked to make the Special Olympics a great day!!!














Varsity Boys' Basketball News

West Virginia Supreme Court Comes To Romney

On December 1, 2006, Mr. Corbin received an invitation from Judge Donald H. Cookman for the students from the WV School for the Deaf to participate in a very unique experience. The West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals had chosen the 22nd Judicial District as the location of its Legal Advancement of West Virginia Students or LAWS project for 2007 and wanted the students from the West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and Blind to be part of it

The LAWS project involves the Justices of our West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals traveling to different locations throughout the state to hear actual cases, rather than doing so in their courtrooms at the State Capitol.

The students in Mr. Adrian's and Mr. Kesler's classes, Jason Holliday, Michael Jarvis, Justin Gregory, County courthouse for the 1:30pm Roderick Stickley, Pamela Thompson, Tiffany Friend, Page Miller, and Matthew Hart, studied the WV Judicial system and one of the 4 cases presented.

With the generous help of a local attorney, Mr. Royce Saville, the students were able to ask questions about the case and acquire some understanding about how the law works, how there are many points of view, and that nothing is black and white.

On April 17, the students had lunch at the Coca Cola Performing Arts Center, where they were able to hear de-briefings of former hearings with lawyers and students of

morning sessions. The teachers and students proceeded to the Hampshire session involving one of the two criminal cases of the day. The students and teachers were able to witness the proceedings from the jury box aided by the excellent interpreting of Mrs. Shari Loar.

Following the trial, the lawyers were available to answer questions from the students. The results of the case will be available before the end of the school year. Mr. Saville stated that he enjoyed working with our students and was very impressed with the amount of enthusiasm and work they put forth on the project. Our students are very interested in the results of the case and learned much from this unique opportunity.


