What are your favorite subjects? Math and WV History.





Principal's Post



MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION

- WHEREAS, the National Association of the Deaf (NAD) will participate as an integral part of the Deaf World Week celebration of the World Federation of the Deaf; and
- WHEREAS, the West Virginia Commission for Deaf and Hard of Hearing and West Virginia Association of the Deaf wholeheartedly endorse and support this public information effort; and
- WHEREAS, representatives from a wide area of leadership in the United States of America serving deaf and hard of hearing population throughout the world will be observing this significant event in recognition of the contributions geared to the needs of deaf and hard of hearing people throughout the country; and
- WHEREAS, the State of West Virginia offers its wholehearted welcome and best wishes to all participants for a renewed spirit of togetherness tempered by intensified commitment to a quality life for the entire deaf and hard of hearing population of the nation;

THEREFORE, I, Mayor of the town of Romney, do hereby proclaim

SEPTEMBER 19 - 24, 2004 as DEAF AWARENESS WEEK

in the town of Romney, and I invite all of our citizens to join me in the observance of this week-long occasion.


This book points out that Mr. Russell Montague played an important role in his family's golf course history. His son, Cary, was the sixth superintendent of the West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and the Blind, from 1910-1914.

Here is a summary of the book: In 1884, less than 20 years after the Civil War, golf finally came to America in a most unlikely place. Russell Montague, a 32-year-old Harvard-educated lawyer, had moved to White Sulphur Springs in the hills of West Virginia, to improve his health.



His Scottish neighbors, George Grant Alexander and Roderick Mac Leod, were men of leisure. When Grant's golf-obsessed cousin, Lione Torin, arrived from Ceylon, these five built, purely for their own pleasure, a nine-hole course on Montague's land. They were unaware that their Oakhurst Links was the first formal golf course in America, or that the sport had any future.

The book is a wonderful addition to our library!









Houseparents selected Tyler Labin and Vanessa







ften I've heard the term. "squared away" used to describe when things are just right; everything in its proper place, looking sharp. After more years in the business of education than I care to mention, I have witnessed our educational system change from a loose, non-matching fit to being "squared away." Not yet perfect, but certainly making great strides in the right direction.

As a beginning teacher, my principal walked me to my classroom and said, "The textbooks are in the bookcase. Choose the one you like the best." There were no curriculum guides and the student achievement tests often included questions about material not covered in my textbooks. Teachers are now much better equipped to prepare today's students tomorrow's workforce in a global society. In West Virginia, a beginning teacher would now receive content standards and objectives for every course. Course standards are devel-

oped by experts in the field with input from business and industry whose invaluable input insures that our instruction is appropriate for practical application. Students are given end of course tests to measure their progress. Our achievement test, now the WESTEST also measures student progress based on the same standards and objectives and identifies areas of weakness.

Many courses now offer dual credit. Students can earn college credit while in high school through a program called EDGE. This program has aligned college objectives with those taught in high school. Specially trained teachers present and test the material. The program provides excellent incentive for the highly motivated student working to get the "edge" on a college degree. Special Education students are also taught using the same content standards, but with necessary modifications and accommodations. Special needs students not capable of achieving content standards receive individualized objectives and are enrolled in the Alternate Assessment. The educational system of our state and our nation has truly made great strides. We teach what we test and test what we teach. There is accountability from bottom to top. It appears to me that we are getting "squared away" in education.


est average receive a certificate for a free pizza from Domino's.



Who teaches the students? Chef Harvey Christie works with the students.


What are Lucas and Tyler learning from Chef Harv? Various skills in culinary arts.


Art Classes Study Early Man

Mrs. Judd's art students are studying early man. They have divided into two tribes, The Lions and The Apes. Each group had to invent some words in a new language (not English or ASL). They had to create basic words such as "hungry," "hi," and "danger." The students learned about "rites of passage," such as when humans transform from being a teenager to an adult. Each tribe will make up a ceremony to celebrate this period of life.


As part of this unit, students made masks with their animal's spirit in mind. To begin, Mrs. Judd "painted" the material on each student's face (the same material doctors and hospitals use for casts). Then each person created his or her own mask from the mold. The art students learned how masks, like clothes, can help make it possible for a person to behave differently. Imagine going to the prom in blue jeans — it just wouldn't be as much fun, and we probably wouldn't use our best

manners! So we put on our fancy clothes and become Cinderella or the Prince for prom night! In the same way,

a mask can symbolically give you an identity to use while you are changing inside – transforming from being a teenager to becoming a young man or a young woman.

Due to the Maine team pulling out of the tournament, a *mixed team* was established from all the teams. Each coach permitted at least one of his players to be a part of this mixed team. West Virginia's designated player was Terry Withrow, and I must add, he did an outstanding job. The conclusion of the day's events was ice cream for everyone in the snack bar area.

Saturday's events started at 9 am with the boys participating in the free throw and knock out competitions. Our WVSD boys won the free throw competition. A player from Rome, Ty Miller, won the knock out competition. Then to everyone's delight anyone wanting to take the floor (coaches, players, spectators) all joined in for a fun competition of knock out. That was quite an entertaining event, seeing the reactions of faces/laughing/good sportsmanship as coaches knocked out players and vice versa.

West Virginia's second display on the floor was a game with Mill Neck. The final results were West Virginia 58 and Mill Neck 12.

Later that day, the American School for the Deaf scored 33 and the *mixed team* scored 36. All the teams enjoyed a pizza party and movie in the snack bar area to end the evening.

Sunday morning started off with the Team 21 and 3-Point Shooting Competitions. In the Team 21 Competition, two teams take the court on each end. For those of you who do not know what a Team 21 Competition is, let me tell you, it can be quite exciting. Five positions, 12 feet from the basket, are marked off, and team players line up behind the first marked area. The time clock runs for 10 minutes. Players start shooting at the corner and follow through, moving to the next marked station after completing the previous station. Points are awarded worth three points for a long shot, rebound the ball and lay-up for 2 pts. and rebound the ball again and lay-up for 1 pts.

WVSD was paired up with Mill Neck for the first round. WVSD scored 289 points and Mill Neck had 200 points. Rome and Austine paired up with ending results Rome 193 and Austine 233. WVSD and Austine were the two highest scoring teams, and were therefore in the championship shoot-off. Final scores

found WVSD again a winner by scoring points of 249 and Austine 223. This was quite an exciting event, and our boys exhibited a great display of talented shooting abilities.

For the 3 point Shooting Competition, each coach selected two players. West Virginia shooters were Jonathan Edwards and Bradley Grey. Rules for the 3 point competition are: 5 areas are marked around the 3 pt. line; each shooter gets 3 shots at each spot. WVSD was paired up with Rome, and Jonathan scored 7 times and Bradley scored 9 times, for a combination score of 16. Rome shooters each scored 7 times, giving them a total of 14. The next pair of teams were Millneck scoring 9 and Austine 15 times. Therefore the final shootout was between West Virginia and Austine. Bradley shot for WVSD and scored 8 times beating the Austine player who scored 7 times. Once again WVSD a winner - way to go Bradley!

The conclusion of the tournament was on Sunday afternoon when Mill Neck and Rome met for the Consultation Game. Rome swept away Mill Neck by winning with the score of 61-24.

Anticipation was felt everywhere. Here were the defending '03-'04 champs (WVSD) who at this point and time in the tournament had excelled in proving their abilities and skills by winning the 3 Point Competition, Foul Shooting, Team 21, and the Lay-up Competitions and, needless to say, both of their elimination games. You just had to be there to experience the atmosphere and nervousness . . . Austine spectators were everywhere, beating their drum, doing cheers on the floor, and even chanting/ stomping their feet while our boys were attempting their foul shoots. Playing on their home court was to Austine's advantage and their determination to take the mighty West Virginia team down was evident. At half time, our team was down by 3 points and everyone was anticipating Coach See's strategy when his team returned to the floor. I have to give Austine credit. They stayed with our WV boys and fought a very physical game. Even at the conclusion of the 3rd quarter, I thought, what is going to happen here? It's anybody's game! The cheering squad for West Virginia consisted of our bus driver, David Nestor, the Child Care Worker who was having difficulty videoing the game with all the excitement, our devoted managers, Tyler and Lucas, and me. That is quite a task, up against what seemed like the whole town of Brattleboro. But into the 4th quarter, West Virginia found their break. If any of you have had the opportunity to see any of their games this year, you (continued on next page)

I truly believe that moment will be embedded in the minds of those boys forever. They played hard and earned the title as the 2004-2005 Boys Division ESDAA Tournament Champs! We are so proud of our Coach,



Paul See, and players Billy, Jeremy, Corey, Bradley, Jonathan, Justin, and Terry. And a special thanks to our hard working

managers, Tyler and Lucas.

The awards ceremony began with the Billy White and Jeremy Cornell being selected for the 1st Team Allstars and Corey Grace chosen for the 2nd Team Allstars. Bradley Grey received his award as the 3 Point Shoot Out winner.

Plaques were given to WVSD for winning the Foul Shooting, Team 21, and Lay-Up competitions.

Individual trophies were given to each team member in addition to a 2 foot team trophy. The 3 foot "Traveling Trophy" was once again in



our possession to house until next year. We had so many trophies, that we had to look for a box to put them all in for transporting home - NO PROBLEM! On Tuesday, February 22, a housewife from the year 1750 visited the art classroom at WVSD Secondary. Mrs. Shirley Carnahan, a local craftsperson, invited students from the Art and Social Studies classes to watch as she demonstrated cleaning, carding, and spinning wool the way a woman from Hampshire County might have done in the early 18th Century. She also talked about her life in Hampshire County.

Wearing clothing from those times, she described the basic chemise and bonnet and the other clothing she would wear, depending on the weather. We were all very surprised to learn that she wore her chemise under her other clothing for a week at a time before washing it! She never took her bonnet off,



even at night. She put another hat on top of her bonnet when she went outdoors in the summer to make sure her skin would be as white as possible. She took maybe 3 baths each year, usually only

in the summer time.

She was not allowed to have any money of her own. Her husband was the only person in the family allowed to have money but she could trade or barter for things she wanted with the wool from her sheep. She also told us that they paid their taxes depending on how many rooms her home had.

Mrs. Carnahan's talk was very interesting. We want to thank her as well as our interpreters, Mr. Adrian and Mrs. Loar for the look back in time.

Spring has arrived and the students are enjoying outdoor activities. Students busy in the eve-









WVSD and you will go far in life.




