
Sylvia Eller is a new student attending WVSD. She is the daughter of Mr. Donald Eller of Rock (Mercer County).


#### **HHS Students In Photo Class**



Administration/ Supervision and Leadership at the University of Kansas. Mr. Blakely describes himself as a lifelong learner who loves to learn something new each day. The thing he likes most about working as a Director of Student Living is helping kids with their needs for the future. Mr. Blakely explained his top three goals for the Residential Life Program at Seaton Hall.

- 1) We will have a curriculum that defines our program and will provide the substance of learning. Also, a well-designed secondary curriculum should be more than a set of disjointed themes and activities. It should be the total planned program of experiences available to individual learners. It will include educational/residential goals, learner outcomes, activity offerings, activity outlines, and even the student activities program. In many ways, the curriculum should be the script that will guide and fuse the interaction of all the key actors in the drama of learning.
- 2) We will try to develop a recipe for results using assessments to drive our instructional/residential program, including student portfolios.
- 3) We all know that in an age of "information power" and untethered technology, the entire universe can be in both the classroom and the dorm room if the residential school is doing it's job. Today, students can access information from literally everywhere on and off this planet. This is why we should use resource-based instruction in our program.

In conclusion, I strongly believe that the future of our residential school for the deaf will most likely be a mixture of old ideas and innovations. Whatever it contains, tomorrow is something that can be shaped and influenced today. The future does not just happen. It has to be invented. Whatever happens to the residential school in the years ahead will have been created, prompted, or allowed by today's "US", the residential school leaders and staff.

After photographing the Homecoming Court, refreshments were served to the entire student body. The delicious treats were made by Mrs. Kuykendall and her classes.


Alumni Weekend

Approximately one hundred alumni attended Alumni weekend October 9-11.




The total enrollment at Gallaudet is 2,000: 1,500 undergraduates, 300 foreign students, and 200 secondary and elementary school students.

At what schools did you teach?

Practicum teaching at Frankfort High School and Mount Savage High School. I was a substitute teacher in Allegany County, Maryland. I was hired as a classroom teacher at WVSD in 1979.

How many years were you Dean of Student Living at WVSD?

I served as Dean of Student Living six years.

What are some of your goals for the rest of the school year?

- 1) To spend more time with students.
- 2) To spend more time in the classrooms.
- 3) To guide the development of a technical education plan for our campus.

Name one thing that you feel good about since you started as principal.

The expertise of our staff and their willingness to work together in the best interest of our students.

As the Director, I would like to share something exciting/educational with you this year called "Building a Strong Student Residential Life Activity (SRLA) Program." Managing an active teenage student body is easier when every student can find a positive "niche" in the residential school- a situation in which they can succeed, grow, become, and be recognized. We educators find students' "comfort zone" program within the SRLA. The program was presented in Seaton Hall for Staff Development Day on January 15th.

Co-curricular, extracurricular, and intramural activities constitute what we call the "second half of the curriculum," and are an essential part of the texture of the residential school. The extent of student involvement in activities is often a measure of residential school climate.

Many problems can be averted by energizing the activity program and broadening participation.

Good <u>SRLA</u> programs do not happen by accident. They grow out of Seaton Hall staff creativity, commitment, and sensitivity to student's and community's needs. As a chief architect of the residential school's activity program, I plan to keep certain essential design features in mind.

Features in mind.
Features of an effective SRLA Program is inclusive
Has flexibility
Is congruent w/overall residential philosophy
Develops skills/faients
Enhances self image
Reinforces ethical behavior
Develops leadership
Is student-oriented (not adult-driven)
Does not exploit students
Teaches life skills
Develops interpersonal skills
Promotes a safe environment
Builds pride
Promotes positive attitudes

Our greatest responsibility to the <u>SRLA</u> Program, however, is to provide qualified and energetic staff leaders. That's what we are doing now. When <u>SRLA</u> functions best, there is an expectation that every staff member will provide leadership for one or more residential (after school) activities.

A well-rounded <u>SRLA</u> Program takes time and effort on the part of the entire staff. The payoff is better behavior and better feelings in the residential school.

Your untiring endeavor toward this program will be greatly appreciated.





Romney, WV- On Feb. 15, 1999, there were only 6 players


On the first day we arrived, it snowed over a foot and was very cold, so we couldn't ski for long periods of time due to a frostbite warning.



The student life meeting at Model Secondary School for the Deaf (MSSD) was held during the second week of March. We had a series of Pre-College National Mission Program's "Sharing Ideas." This presentation, under Dr. Kathy Jankowski's leadership, helped give teachers, parents, researchers, school administrators, student life personnel, and policy makers many ideas for working with the deaf and hard of hearing student. Papers and videos of interest were also included in the program.

meeting The was designed to inspire goaldirected programming, share some ideas, and open a dialogue that elicited more ideas. strategies, and creative solutions. We shared our input, ideas, reactions and solutions that have worked to enhance student life in our residential schools.



Most of us are here because we are keenly aware that Student Life personnel play a critical role in developing the whole student. Unfortunately, however, most of us are also well aware that the focus of our students' education often tends to be almost entirely on the academic portion of the knowledge, skills, and experiences each student will need. As we enter the new millennium, all the information we have about the success of graduates points to an urgent need to look

at the role student life must play if we are to truly create a program of empowering education for deaf and hard of hearing people.

Student Life as used here - refers to all programming that takes place outside normal school hours. This includes extracurricular activities (referred to after-school programs) athletics, dormitory activities and social events. In most instances, students benefitting from Student Life programs are residential students who go home on weekends or during breaks when residential school is closed. However, there are also many commuter students (day students who do not reside in the residence) who benefit from Student Life Programs.

Many of us are here because we recognize that the individuals, attitude, and events young people encounter outside the classroom play a critical role in shaping their lives. But how exactly is Student Life programming being carried out? And is it done systemically? According to our observations, residential schools often leave it to chance and/or the whims of a few creative people with wonderful ideas and boundless energy. But effective programming in Student Life requires exactly that: a fully-planned, wellcoordinated program in which the whole student is taken into consideration. In such a program, there would be consistency in goals and close communication between classroom teachers and Student Life personnel. In such an educational community, the Student Life component would be considered by parents, teachers, staff, and students to be a vital part of each student's education and the role of the Student Life personnel would be as critical as that of teachers.

I am pleased to tell you that the partnership of the Student Life director and High School principal at WVSD is in the process of developing activities for this year. Also, I am pleased to be addressing you about this matter on Parents' Day, April 2.

A special room was also set up for photos taken by Mrs. Dodgins.


