Dr. Shank, how did you become interested in teaching WVSDB? Before I came to WVSD, I taught at the Medical School at West Virginia Univer-

sity. I wanted to be a scientist, but one day I was home (Keyser, WV) and a woman at my church mentioned that there was a one-year position available as a science teacher at the West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and the Blind. I took that job in 1981 and loved it, so I stayed. How did you become interested in being the Superintendent of WVSDB? I took this job because I wanted a challenge, and because I have some new ideas. I have about ten more years until I retire, and I thought it would be a good way to continue my years here.

When did you begin your career at WVSDB? October 5, 1981 - twenty-six years ago!

What positions have you held since coming to this campus? I started as a science teacher at the Secondary School for the Deaf (grades 7-12). During my last few years there, I taught half a day and served as the campus coordinator of grants and federal programs, staff development, and technology the other half of the day. In July 1997, I became principal of the Elementary School for the

Where is your hometown? Keyser, WV. I graduated from Keyser High School and still have a home there, but part of the time I live here on campus.

Where did you receive your degrees? Ihave a BA degree in biology from Bridgewater College, Bridgewater, VA; I have an MA degree in deaf education from McDaniel College, Westminster, MD; and my doctorate is in school administration and supervision from the University of Virginia, Charlottesville, VA. I've also completed a lot of graduate work at WVU in Morgantown.

What do you think is the most positive thing about our school? The sense of community, the support of staff and students - these make us feel like a family. The fact that we have a small number of students is a positive thing in regard to everyone getting to know each other.

What are your goals for WVSDB? To be the best school for the Deaf and the Blind in the United States. I want students to learn about 21st Century technology. I think technology will be everyone's future, including those with vision and hearing issues. I hope we can work with other schools to give students more education. I would like to see a lot more collaboration for the deaf. I would like to see more interaction between staff and students. I would like to see more involvement with alumni and other groups. I am trying to find ways that we can spread the word about our school.

Do you think you can improve our school? I really hope to succeed in improving our school!

What are your feelings about being named Superintendent? It is a huge honor, because I never expected it. If someone had told me 25 years ago that I would be appointed as superintedent of WVSDB. I would have never believed it. This is a big responsibility, but it is also a huge honor.






The varsity volleyball team opened the season at home against the Pirates of Paw Paw. After a slow start, the girls hustled in game #3 but fell short 25-23.

FFA's Top Salesperson





Roddy Stickley and Page Miller reported to campus early this summer to prepare for their upcoming sport seasons as members of the Hampshire Trojans.





Roderick Stickley, Freshman: It has been an honor for me to come back and compete again.






David Worlobah: Our Visit to WVSDB

Editor's Note: We have had some very special visitors from Liberia at WVSD&B this year. We asked Mr. David Worlobah to tell their story.

I am Mr. David T. Worlobah, II, the Director of the Hope For The Deaf School of the United Methodist Church, situated in the city of Monrovia, specifically on the compound of the United Methodist Church in Sinkor. I am responsible for coordinating and planning programs, as well as monitoring instructor and student performance to make sure that it is in accordance with the school's own

academic requirements.

Our school is a renovated 4 classroom building, with an enrollment of about 50

students and 4 instructors. This building is owned by the Conference United Method is t Women of the Liberia Annual Conference, United Methodist Church. Our academic year begins in Sep-

tember and ends in June, and our classes run from 8 AM to 1:30 PM daily. We begin our classes at 8 AM, because our kids have to commute to and from school. This is a problem

we are trying to solve.

Our government has a high interest in the education of the disabled, including the deaf. But, because of financial constraints, our government is not able to do

much for this community, especially in the area of training

in Special Education, and in the provision of needed equipment for the deaf and blind, as well as the construction of schools.

The Liberian team visiting WVSDB is very grateful to God for such a wonderful and educational trip. We came here through a special arrangement initiated by Mrs. Sheila Hamilton. At the time, she was a member of the State Board of Education and a chairlady of the Asbury United Methodist Church Mission Committee and was highly supported by a dedicated man of God, the

This idea was warmly received and approved by the then superintendent of WVSDB, Mrs. Jane McBride and the Board. The selection of WVSDB was made through an understanding between Rev. Rudolph Bropleh and Mrs. Sheila Hamilton, I was then contacted in Liberia by Rev. Bropleh to arrange a trip to WVSDB for 10 deaf and blind students and teachers. According to the communication from Rev. Bropleh, the group was to be divided into two, with the first group being from the School for the Blind in Liberia. The second group will be from the School for the Deaf and is supposed to arrive at WVSDB around April of 2008. Tickets have been provided by the president of Liberia, Madam Ellen Johnson-Sirleaf.

Our visit here at WVSDB is twofold; exposure to new teaching methodologies with the deaf and blind, and exposure to the use of modern technologies as far as deaf and blind education is concerned.

Activities

In order to achieve this goal, we have organized and engaged ourselves in various academic and after school activities. We have been privileged to have witnessed and sometimes participated in activities such as swimming, weight lifting, sports, and an introduction to a game for the blind called Goalball. We are also involved in learning the language (Sign Language) of the deaf as far as their culture

is concerned to enable us to interact effectively with them, as well as the use of modern equipment for the blind such as Jaws computer software, Braille Note, etc. Most of our interaction with the students and teachers is basically centered on teacher-student relationships with each other. This

is vital to us, considering the students' levels of comprehension and specific strategies in lesson planning and presentation to the deaf and blind in a given situation.

Trips

We have also been able to make a couple of trips with the students at different times. We have been able to travel with the blind on Orientation and Mobility trips to places such as Cumberland, MD, Winchester, VA, and Washing-

ton DC. With the deaf, we were able to visit the prestigious Gallaudet University in Washington DC. These trips were very educational and rewarding, giving a clearer picture of what the deaf and blind are capable of doing outside of their own environments. Indeed, the deaf and blind can do anything when the opportunity is given to them.

Observation

During our time here at WVSDB, the following were observed:

 a. the availability of instructional materials is vital in deaf and blind education.

b. a comfortable and responsive classroom should have no more than 10 students in a class.

 c. teacher position in class is very critical, thereby easily maintaining student attention.

d. in spite of their different languages, the deaf and blind coexist comfortably, something I believe to be a

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Classroom


One important aspect of our activities concerning lesson planning and presentation is our regular classroom visitations. Our regular classroom visitations have given us brighter ideas on developing a lesson plan format, lesson design, and performance model for the deaf and blind. In this, we were privileged to have been exposed to the use of some modern equipment such as a video phone, TTY, a Sign

Language Tutorial CD for the deaf, Braille writer, and the use Jaws computer software.

Extracurricular Activities

Extracurricular activities have been of great importance to us in considering the activities of our kids back home. We were able to learn a new type of sport for the blind called Goalball. We observed and sometimes participated in activities such as swimming, volleyball, and basketball. We're encouraged to see the students' (deaf) involvement in the publication of the school newspaper and their yearbook, supervised and monitored by the instructors in a classroom setting. This is very exciting, The students (deaf) are also involved in productive organizations such as FFA. ***

What I hope to take home to Liberia is the uniqueness of the deaf and blind communities. I am going to take home the need to stress the importance of the teacherstudent relationship and the importance of developing a special curriculum for the deaf and blind. I will also be taking home the need for the deaf to know that they are blessed with the capacity to do anything, and need, therefore, to make use of every opportunity to develop themselves.





o best describe what is taking place at WVSD, I borrow a line from one of my favorite speeches by the late, great Dr. Martin Luther King -- "We're on the move now!"

Our movement really picked up its pace throughout the past several weeks. We moved from Deaf Awareness Week to Spirit Week/Homecoming, and then to ACT Plan/Explore testing, followed by Fall Conference.

In addition to these activities, students have been involved in club meetings and activities including the FFA's project at Gourmet Central. Volleyball games and the ESDAA tournament in New York, football and cross country practice and games, dormitory trips and activities, and the National FFA Convention in Indianapolis, Indiana must also be mentioned.

ally hear from students is that they are "bored" and have "nothing to do." I have to ask, "Are you kidding me?"



Sale in Charleston on March 9, 2008.







Yield: Makes 8 servings Calories: 198





Prior to the play, WVSD students and staff were given a tour of the Kennedy Center.



Juniors and Seniors Tour NRCC







Other students who participated are Samantha Johnson, Maddie Mongold, Roddy Stickley and Pam Thompson.






Four Students Named All-Stars at OSD Tournament





Career Majors Students Tour Wellness Center







We hope all of you will come to our games and cheer us on!!






