#### WVSD&B Celebrates 125th Birthday

Plans to celebrate WVSD&B's 125th birthday have been underway since last spring. This week's events include a tree planting, an open house, a country fair and picnic, a field day, historical skits, and a panel of former staff and alumni. In addition, a video about the school has been made, and a commemorative booklet has been published.

#### SOME HISTORICAL FACTS

In the late 1860's, Howard Johnson, a blind teacher from Franklin, WV, convinced the state Legislature of the need to establish a state school for deaf and blind students. The West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and Blind opened their doors for the first time on September 29, 1870, one hundred twenty-five years ago. Twenty-five deaf and five blind students were enrolled. Just three years later, the population jumped to 60 deaf and 17 blind students.

From 1863 (when West Virginia became a state) until 1870, the deaf and blind students of West Virginia either did not go to school, or went to schools of neighboring states, especially Maryland and Ohio.

When the school first opened, and up until around 1970, many of the teachers lived at the school. In 1870, room and board cost \$12.50 a month for teachers living at the school.

In the early days, many students traveled to school on trains and wagons. Students went home only twice a year. In the 1930s the school transported some students on buses, but most still traveled on trains. In 1941, all students began traveling to and from school on buses.

From 1874 to 1900 boys were gray uniforms every day to school. Until 1920, girls were uniforms on Sundays and holidays: blue for winter, and white for fall and

spring. The boys' and girls' uniforms were made in the school's tailoring department.

Over the years, some instruction was done using the oral method, but sign language has always been used at our school.

#### **Class Comments**

#### AGRICULTURE/SCIENCE

Once in the while something done for one reason turns out to benefit in other ways. So it is with the flower-vegetable garden planted and maintained by the WVSD agriculture/science classes. The garden has been a part of the ag/science program for two years now. The site of the garden was previously an unnoticed grass plot between a sidewalk and the rear of the junior/senior high school building.


Students built the bed, loaded, hauled, and unloaded the soil, and planted vegetable seeds and flower sets. The process provided experience in construction, soil preparation, seed and flower identification, proper methods of sewing seeds, and setting out young plant starts.

Plastic weed shield material was used to cover the ground to minimize weed growth, but students worked to eliminate those weeds that managed to grow through the shield. Students also learned to mix plant food, to use automatic watering

sprinklers. and how to connect the feeding system and watering system together. When students left for summer break, the garden was established. During the summer, the garden was maintained. When SH1= dents returned for



Students also planted, mulched, and maintained several ornamental shrubs and trees in the fall of 1995. Students continue

to maintain these plantings. We had great success with our ornamentals. losing only one to the dry weather we had in Romney this summer.

All the ornamental bushes and trees, flowers, and some of the vegetable plants are included in the horticulture and landscaping/nursery vocational contests each fall at WVU in Morgantown. Judging team members will use the living examples here at school to practice for the contests held on October 4-6.

This ongoing agriculture/ science project has added to the participating students' knowledge and working skills, and has helped them to begin to develop good working habits necessary for finding and keeping a job in today's work world.

Along with the intended educational goals, this project has benefited others in several ways. People arriving at school in the

morning get a small lift as they pass by this beautiful collection of flowers. Romney residents who often exercise by walking on the WVSD campus have expressed appreciation for this small effort to improve the setting on campus. What had

been a rather drab location has now become a pleasant place to pass by. We have birds feeding on the sunflower seeds and hummingbirds feeding on the many impatiens.

Plans are in the works to establish a tree arboretum on campus. We hope to plant twenty-five different varieties of trees this fall.



Barbie White.


We had a special lunch with beautiful decorations on the tables.





The group recently presented a TDD and training loop to both the Elementary and Secondary departments.


Mrs. Getty will work with our students to help them learn TDD abbreviations and manners, as well as business use (ordering things, making doctor's appointments) and even friendly chats.



John Deuel, head coach, stated that the Varsity team expects a good season with lots of improvements.




#### THE MEETING


#### **WVSD - 1996 ESDAA CHAMPIONS!**





Theatre West Virginia, a professional drama group based in Beckley, visited WVSD March 19-21.

Many people only associate Theatre West Virginia (TWV) with the Mountain State's outdoor dramas "Honey in the Rock" and "Hatfields and McCoys." However, this touring company has been educating and entertaining students in West Virginia and surrounding states for more than 20 years. In 1994 TWV played to more than 120,000 in-state students. This sort of experience enriches young lives by exposing them, often for the first time, to the performing arts.

TWV performs classic literature for young adult audiences, self-esteem-oriented children's theatre for elementary and middle school students, and fairy tales for preschool and elementary school children.

This year, TWV's classic literature performance was Mary Shelley's "Frankenstein". Through humor, "It's Not Magic, It's Me!" gave students a lesson in self-esteem. Thursday, acting and behind-the-scenes workshops were held with the students.

Theatre West Virginia's visit here was made possible through a 50/50 grant from the Arts and Humanities Section of the West Virginia Commission on the Arts.




#### Ski '96



# Ag-Science Students Get Some Hands-On Experience


Students in the afternoon agriculture/science classes recently enjoyed two afternoon field trips. The first trip was to the Civil War trenches located southwest of Romney on a ridge overlooking the South Branch of the Potomac. Students got field experience in tree identification, fingus identification, firsthand experiences with some of the local reptiles and amphibians, river bottom plants, local geology, and a lesson in property lines and survey marks.

The second field trip was to the Clyde Bonar family farm located in Mineral County, adjacent to Hampshire County. On the afternoon of our visit, Reverend Calvin McCutcheon, a methodist minister and professional sheep shearer, was shearing the Bonar flock of ewes.

As we watched, Rev. McCutcheon sheared 10 to 12 sheep. As one of the sheep was sheared, we timed the procedure. We were amazed that the sheep went from fully fleeced to sheared in three minutes and fifteen seconds.

After watching, we were offered the chance to shear. Timothy Garton, Eric Crawford, and Jason Hanshaw tried their hand at shearing. All agreed that shearing sheep is a lot harder than it looks. Rev. McCutcheon complimented Tim by saying that he has a natural knack for shearing.


While at the farm, we also had the opportunity to get up close and personal with two of the Bonar's heifers. We put halters on them, and the students got the chance to lead them. Mr. Charles Bonar also showed us how the cattle are tattooed in the ears for identification purposes, how bulls are neutered, and how sheeps' tails are docked.

Recently in ag/science classes, we have been in the greenhouse transplanting flower and vegetable plants that we started from seed. Our greenhouse is smaller than years past, because the school does not have the funds to repair or replace the ancient greenhouse we use.

We have been studying farm livestock and trying to become acquainted with much of the vocabulary we would be using on our farm visit. Also, we have been repairing our lawn and garden equipment to get ready for the spring weather and the renewal of the lawns and plants that we care for on our campus.

The FFA recently had a fund raising sale of Biomats. We sold over \$1200 worth of seed mats. This raised more than \$500 for our chapter treasury. Tasha Goodrich led in sales and won a prize of her choosing from the FFA catalogue.





# **Baltimore Trip**






