We may take an early trip to the golf course for a golf clinic.


DORM NEWS







On October 10th, Mr. Leatherman's groundskeeping class left at 1:00 p.m. to go to a Burlington church to help a group of people to trim bushes.




*foods reduced in fat. sugar, and salt







Sheena Smith went to The Bank of Romney, where she shadowed Ms. Brenda Hasalew, New Accounts.



"Shadowing" at WVSD

The West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and the Blind have been privileged to host Theatre

West Virginia (TWV) for the past four years, bringing such cultural experiences as Huck Finn. The Man in the Iron Mask, and Cyrano de Bergerac to our rural area. This year, the group will bring for the first time on tour, Honey in

the Rock. Through a grant from the WV Department of Cultural and History's Arts and Humanities section, we are able to present TWV to our school and our community on March 17.

The recommendation from our staff, students, and Cultural Arts Committee to provide our students with an improved method for interpreting plays prompted us to search for a better way. While researching, we discovered "shadows", a concept utilizing one interpreter for each actor, following the actor on stage, and assuming that particular role. Dressed in black, a Shadow is not a distraction but rather an enhancement to the understanding of the characters and the plot.

Since October, the shadows' responsibilities have included understanding the characters, translating dialogue into sign language, thinking about positions on stage, reviewing the video tape of the performance, and educating our students to the idea of shadowing.

The West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and the Blind sincerely appreciate the grant provided by the WV Department of Cultural and History's Arts and Humanities section and the opportunity to bring this cultural experience to our rural area.



to continue job training in his home county after graduation.




Joshaua Hamilton

On May 14th the school traveled to Antietam, a Civil War battlefield located in Sharpsburg, MD.


