



Probably you have noticed a term, "Secondary Residential Education Program" at Seaton Hall. Let me explain that we all know that there is a legitimate reason for having a residential school for the deaf. It's called Deaf and Hard of Hearing students. Everything the Director and the staff do should be somehow connected with making things better for students and helping them become what they need to be. Just as successful businesses are increasing customer awareness and becoming service oriented, the best residential schools understand that they must be student-centered.

I am so pleased with our residential school staff who listens well, involves people in meaningful ways, cares about our learners as individuals and a total community, and responds quickly and constructively when a student's problems or needs arise. We call our



staff case managers, with the teachers as advisors.

Managing the student body of a modern secondary residential school is different and difficult. Today's students are more assertive, worldlier, more questioning, and more at risk than previous generations of learners. They are also vulnerable and more in need of coping and problem solving skills than ever before. Building our residential school to meet the needs of today's student body is challenging - but it is also manageable, rewarding, and what the residential school is supposed to be all about. That's why we are determined to do something about our program:

- * Impose order and organization on the chaos of adolescence.
 - * Remove barriers for learner growth.
- * Establish a safe, sane, and healthy environment for students to learn what they need to know.
- * Maximize opportunities for students to be the best they can be (to release the hidden hero in every adolescent learner).

The Director's Creed: "All students can learn". I am certain that all the staff agree. This year we are working hard to build an effective management of modern secondary students. It starts with an attitude of optimism, hope, and confidence in today's learners. This view of what is possible is most simply stated as, "All Students Can Learn!" This is an attitude that starts with our residential school's leading administrators and staff and must permeate

The current attitude about students, however, is like a fresh breeze blowing new life into this organization. It changes the entire organization of our residential school for the deaf. It creates a new set of possibilities. If we believe that we can teach every single student and that they, in turn, can learn and be successful, teaching becomes fun again.

Here are some educationally exciting activities that are called after-school activities:

*Tuesdays and Thursdays
Tutoring Center- students who have difficulty
understanding some subject areas may receive
help. This has been in effect since August
24th.

* Wednesdays Special Topics- Students' rights and responsibilities, Deaf Heritage Study (to learn more about their own deaf leaders in history) and more.

- * Progress Report at Seaton Hall is not the traditional A,B,C progress report. It is information to parents about their child's progress in activities such as after-school activities, intramural activities, outdoor education activities, etc. The dormitory owes students and parents more complete and definitive information about individual progress and mastery of specific student outcomes. We are in the process of improving the SRE Portfolio this coming fall.
- * Believing that all students can learn implies a willingness to take on all comers. We accept and accommodate whatever new activities from which our students can benefit.

Let us thank you for your efforts to make the WVSD student body stand above all others. May we work together "in the spirit of excellence towards the 21st Century" to make our residential school the best it can be.

September Field Trip To Mt. Vernon



New WVCDHH Director Visits WVSD



Mrs. Charity Reedy Hines, recently appointed director of the Commission for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, visited our school and spoke with our students. She has been working for the WVDHHR since October 1, 1999. She grew up in Harrisonburg, Virginia and is maried to Daniel Hines, a Deaf/Blind interpreter by profession. They have two deaf children; Amberlin, who will soon be 5 years old and Reedy, who is 2 years old. Her children are the sixth generation in her family to be deaf. She is a proud graduate of Gallaudet University, receiving a BA in 1989 and an MA in 1997.

Mrs. Hines' long term goal includes everyone who is a deaf, hard of hearing, deaf/blind, late-deafened, and deaf multiple-disabled individual. She wants all to achieve maximum participation and productivity in society. This means no gaps in the program and service delivery to these populations. This would mean no more barriers to every day life and having the opportunity to live independently. This would also mean no more isolation regardless of the degree of hearing loss or status.

In order to reach this long term goal, Mrs. Hines has many short and on-going goals. They range from establishing one and five-year strategic plans for the Commission, to establishing interagency collaboration, maintaining a census/register of the deaf, hard of hearing and deaf/blind population, attending Town Hall meetings throughout the state and hopefully having a task force formed to study programs and service delivery. The report from the Town Hall meetings and task force will enable the Commission to give supporting documentation to the legislators for certain bills the deaf, hard of hearing, and deaf/blind community needs and funding for those needs. Right now, the Commission is in its planning stage. Results are unavailable until all the reports are compiled. However, concerns are most welcome any time!

Mrs. Hines says she decided to work for this program because she enjoys working with people. Health and Human Resources is about and for people. Therefore, working at the Commission for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing is a perfect place to continue working with people.









State College






New Greenhouse Will Become A Reality in the New Millennium





here is a new greenhouse under construction at our school. Mr. Leatherman, Agriculture instructor and FFA advisor, has wanted a new greenhouse for quite some time. His dream finally came true with help from the Hampshire High School Agriculture Education program, Faculty Senate funds, grants from Potomac Valley Soil Conservation District, School to Work funds, vocational funds, a modernization grant, and agriculture grants. The purpose of the new greenhouse is to provide

a resource for students and reinforce skills learned in vocational and academic classes. Plans for the new greenhouse include an aquaponics system and a plant growing area. WVSD agriculture education students, FFA members, and Hampshire High students will construct the greenhouse from the pad up. Mr. Leatherman feels that it will be up by May of this year and operational in the fall of this year.

This year several exciting committees are in the process of laying out the nuts and bolts of succeeding as we, secondary residential school leaders, are trying to relish the renewal and challenge of change. Here are some observations:

No matter what form the residential school for the deaf of tomorrow assumes, it is almost certain to have some of the same look of the residential school we manage today. Education in America tends to move forward in waves and cycles. Despite all the clamor for radical reform/major restructuring, much of what changes in educational organizations is more a matter of recycling than of total transformation.

The pattern of secondary residential school education in our country reflects a number of movements that come and go and reappear later with new twists and additional trappings. Back to basics, accountability, and humanizing the residential schools are among the many recurring themes that periodically take center stage in educational discussions across the nation.

The important thing is for us to appreciate that each time residential schools retry an old idea or resurrect a past picture, we do better. We have to remember that the trick is to avoid becoming cynical.

It is a mistake to view the cyclical nature of educational change as an exercise of going in circles - getting nowhere. Progress in education is more like a spiral than a circle. Each time residential schools revisit a program or a practice, it is cranked up a notch, improved, and refined. We at WVSD&B understand this and make the most/best of it.

The best way to manage the future is to be a student of the past and present. When an old idea resurfaces, remember and learn from what may have gone wrong in the past and stay fresh to new possibilities towards the new millennium!

contract with the Koppers Company. All three students work in the car detailing area. Tracy and Joe also work in the area of foods.



The meeting was very positive and informative. Mrs. Hines mentioned that Romney had fewer concerns than any meeting to date. A reflection on our school, perhaps?



Edward "Ed" Czernicki, who taught Driver's Education at WVSD for 29 years, died February 16 at the Washington Hospital Center in Washington, DC.


Born December 30, 1926 in Thorp, Wisconsin, he was the son of the late Joseph and Clara (Hodorowdi) Czernicki.

Ski Trip



That's all I have to say, and I hope I didn't miss anything!





Prior to her position on our





Following the tour, IMC provided pizza, veggies, hot wings, and soda to club members.







WVSD&B staff and students will miss Mrs. Boley!


Greenhouse/Aquaponics Facility Is Under Roof!



Each athlete competed in three events and received ribbons as well.


