





program must have 85 percent membership in the past year.








College Information for Students



WVSD Students Study the Art of Quiltmaking


For the past several weeks, students in English, Graphic Design, Family and Consumer Science, history, math, reading, and art classes have been involved in a cross curricular study of quilts. Teachers have presented lessons in a variety of ways, including articles, myths, short stories, and the novel, A Stitch in Time (English); America's quilting history from Colonial times to the present (history); pattern design and measurements (math); computer-generated quilt patterns (Graphic Design); various mediums of quilt designs and quilting (art); The Art of Quilting (Family and Consumer Science); a play based on the story, The Quiltmaker's Gift (reading).

The culmination of this study took place on the morning of December 18 in the MPR. Special guests were invited to attend the play and view classroom displays of student work.


































































Students Visit NTID





Thank You, Hampshire County Quiltmakers!

For the past three years, a group of women know as the Community Quilters of Hampshire County has dedicated its time, talents, and most of all love, to create handmade quilts.

On December 4, the ladies were finishing up the last of the 170 personalized quilts (twin or lap-sized) for every student attending the West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and the Blind.

"We worked with contacts from the school to identify specific needs and interests of each child, so that the quilts could be personalized," said Maureen Wysopal, coordinator.

And quilts alone didn't satisfy one of the CQHC members. Jackie Shaffer said, "What is a Christmas

gift without the wrapping?" The women took her comment to heart and made a pillow case to match every quilt. "This project has been unbelievably rewarding," said a teary-eyed Pam Brady, coordinator. "These girls put their hearts and souls, their talents, creativity and even their own money into our projects."

Wysopal said when the English teachers at WVSD Secondary heard about the quilt project, they responded by planning collaborative activities related to quilting for their classes.

English/Language Arts students researched the world of quilting, studied short stories and quilt myths, discussed articles, and read the novel, <u>A Stitch in Time</u>. Graphic arts-photography

students took pictures of the quilts and designed computer generated quilt squares. Social studies students worked on quilt history.

The math teachers taught how math is used in pattern design and measurements in the making of a quilt. The Underground Railroad quilt myths brought a study in written and oral history.

Art students used various mediums of quilt design and made their own quilt squares. ProStart (food services) students organized and planned a reception to follow the quilt drama, serving, in part, a beautiful and delicious Patriotic Quilt cake.

The students and teachers of WVSD entertained the quilting group December 18 with a play entitled <u>The Quiltmaker's Gift.</u> The play reflected all the different class teachings.

The gathering at the school on the 18th was as emotional for the givers as it was for the receivers. "It was a large project to complete in a year, but those smiles erased the workload stress."







Before moving too far ahead, I would be remiss in not thanking,







3/2 - 2nd Sec. Tournament WVSD 50 Pendleton 63




We ended the season with a record of 10 - 10.

For several years the ProStart classes have been providing delicious full-course meals for this


